Entry requirements

- Level 4 in maths and a level 6 in English is required due to half the course being coursework based.
- Excellent time management and the ability to write in an accurate, coherent and succinct way.
- Ability to independently research topics to support arguments within coursework

Why choose this course?

In health and social care roles, you will have a positive influence on the lives of other people. From supporting the care of service users by improving both physical and mental well-being, maintaining safety procedures and policies at work, to supporting the development of children's cognitive abilities. Choosing to study health and social care can open you up to a variety of different roles, working anywhere from hospitals to prisons. This course will allow access to all other routes in health and social care.

All medical based courses, including nursing and midwifery, require further education, usually at degree level. It will be essential for students to take at least one, but preferably 2 A levels alongside this qualification if they are planning this as a career path. They must also ensure they undertake work experience to broaden their appeal.

Possible career pathway
