Course content

What does the course involve?	 A Level - Year I. Unit I Britain 1930-1997 Exam: 25% of total A level This unit is made up of the following: an enquiry topic on Churchill from 1930 - 1951 including Churchill as wartime Prime Minister and a period study of Britain between 1951- 1997. This will include a focus on the politics, economics and social change during this period as well as examining Britain's position in the world. Unit 2 The Cold War in Asia 1945-1993 Exam: 50% of total AS and 15% of total A level This unit is made up of 4 key topics. These include western
	 policies in Post War Asia 1945-1979; the Korean War and its impact to 1977; Indochina 1945-1967 and wars in Vietnam and Cambodia 1968-1993. A level - Year 2 Unit 3 Popular Culture and the Witchcraze of the 16th and 17th Centuries Exam: 40% of total A level This unit focuses on the rise and decline in witchcraft during the 16th and 17th centuries and how far it emerged out of the popular culture of the time. It will examine the reasons for the increase and subsequent decline in persecutions, the nature of the Witchcraze, the reactions of the authorities and its impact on society. The Witchcraze will be examined in a variety of countries and regions in order to be able to establish patterns and make comparisons.
+	Unit 4 Topic Based Essay Students will have the opportunity to research a topic of their own choice and complete a 3000-4000 essay.

Possible career pathway

Have you ever thought about becoming a Media Researcher and investigating the subjects to be covered by a documentary or series, and/or help to come up with ideas for topics and new shows?
